DESCRIPTION In this unit students study pharmacological terminology, the classification of commonly used drugs according to their pharmacological actions and investigates drug side effects and interactions. A thorough systems review of material medica is undertaken and an introduction the methods of Sankaran, Scholten and Sherr

LEARNING OUTCOMES By the conclusion of the unit of study, students should be able to:

1. Describe and compare different types of drug names-chemical, generic & brand
2. Describe the process of the distribution of prescribed drugs through the body.
3. Apply their knowledge of the effects of drugs on the human body when assessing patients' state of health in clinical situations.
4. Identify drugs used to treat particular systems, and assist patients with methods of reducing and preventing possible side effects associated with these substances.
5. Outline the role of the periodic table in the relationships and understanding of homoeopathic medicines according to Sankaran's model.
6. Outline the role of the periodic table in the relationships and understanding of homoeopathic medicines according to Scholten's model.
7. Demonstrate an understanding of new homoeopathic provings by Sherr.
8. Demonstrate case taking techniques for the treatment and management of children's cases.
9. Demonstrate the use of materia medica of the marine world and its homoeopathic approach to disease states.
10. Explain the limitations inherent in becoming a homoeopathic practitioner and running a homoeopathic practice.

TEACHING METHOD Modified lecture, group and class discussions, demonstrations and practical demonstrations with case studies.
